Outreach and collaboration with Tucson Police Department (2021-Present)

A collaboration is beginning to take shape between faculty in SGPP, the Arizona Policy Lab and the Tucson Police Department's research office. While talks are still in their early stages, multiple projects have been discussed, including an examination of recreational marijuana and whether the loss of marijuana smell as a pretext for searches has reduced the rate of firearm confiscations, as well as an evaluation of the departments "Hot-spots" policing initiative. Anne Boustead and I are slated to take on the former, while Javier Osorio, Anne Boustead, David Dow, and I are likely all going to be involved with the "Hot-spots" policing evaluation.

Outreach and collaboration with Maricopa County Judicial Branch (2021-Present)

The Judicial Branch of Arizona in Maricopa County (Dr. Elizabeth Eells), myself, and Dr. Adam Fine (Assistant Professor of Criminology at Arizona State University), began collaborating in the summer of 2021 on a project assessing the degree to which racial and ethnic disparities emerge at nine discrete judicial discretion points (including pretrial detention, diversion, sentencing, early release, and others) using a decade of case-level data from three administrative systems: Juvenile Probation, Adult Probation, and Adult Superior Court. An expanded letter of intent is currently under review at Arnold Ventures.
